# Harvard Case Discussion Martin Luther King \& The Struggle for Black Voting Rights 

## Event Report: December 2018

## Executive Summary

## * The Participants

- 84 people participated in the case study event and 40 responded to the survey.
- Participants were about $2 / 3$ female and $1 / 3$ male.
- The two largest groups were League of Women Voters (39\%) and Greenwich High School (31\%).
- The two largest age cohorts were $50+(46 \%)$ and Under 18 (43\%).


## The Invitation and Reasons for Attending

- Attendees were invited by their affiliated organizations.
- Main reason for attending was a desire to participate in a Harvard case study class.
* Assessment of Pre-Reading and Event
- Almost all participants viewed the pre-reading assignment favorably.
- $93 \%$ of participants said that they would recommend that other teachers, schools and civic groups adopt this method of teaching;
- $80 \%$ or more said that they enjoyed the case method of teaching and would attend future events like this one.


## Executive Summary

* Assessment of Case Facilitation
- All three moderators (Jessica Keller, Karen Boyea and Steve Swidler) were highly rated.
* Impact and Follow-Up
- "Women's rights and the fight over the Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution" received the highest vote for a future case discussion event.
- As a result of attending the discussion:
- $64 \%$ of participants said they would be much more likely to approach future political discussions more constructively, especially when presented with an opposing point of view.
- $38 \%$ would be much more likely to get involved in politics, and
- $26 \%$ would be much more likely to vote.

## As a Result of Participation, Likelihood to...

- 64\% of participants said they would be much more likely to approach future political discussions more constructively, especially when presented with an opposing point of view.
